

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

As Halloween is not far away, it's time to remember some of the safety issues concerning Halloween. Parents should review these safety tips with their children:



- Make sure small children are accompanied by an adult.
- Trick or treaters should never carry pumpkins or other objects with a real flame or fire in them. Use artificial lighting.
- Costumes should be reflective, should not obscure the vision of the wearer, and not cause the wearer to trip and fall. Children should never carry sharp or unsafe props. Use fake props.
- Children should carry flashlights and have flashing lights or glow sticks attached to their costumes.
- Trick or treaters should obey all traffic rules, such as not walking in the street, walking against the flow of traffic and crossing the street at intersections, if possible.
- Do not accept candy or other food objects that do not have a protective covering or wrapper. *All* treats should be checked, regardless, before being consumed.
- Homeowners: If you wish to participate in Halloween, please have the front of your house well lit. Remove any obstacles that someone could fall over.
- Trick or treaters: respect the property of others. Do not damage or vandalize someone's property.

Fall Leaf Pick-Up

The Village Maintenance Department will pick up your leaves IF they are placed in a container that can be easily dumped or you may rake leaves to the edge of the street. Please separate your leaves and limbs into separate piles.





Census data and elections

Census data determines how many seats your state gets in Congress. State and local officials use census data to draw boundaries for state and local legislative districts and school districts.

Hard-to-Count Populations

- People of color
- Immigrants
- Children under 5
- Low-income households
- Homeless individuals
- Highly mobile individuals – students and young people
- People with limited internet access

Who is counted in the Census? Census forms are filled out by household. Everyone living at the address matters and everyone needs to be counted, including children.

How do I fill it out? You can respond online using the unique Census ID that will be mailed to you. If you don't have internet access, you can respond by phone or mail.

How is Census information used? Being counted helps communities create jobs, provide housing, fund K-12 education, prepare for emergencies and build schools, roads, hospitals and libraries

What questions will be asked on the Census? The Census asks for less personal information than most social media profiles. Items like name, gender, age, birthday, race/ethnicity, relationship to head-of-household, owner or renter and phone number are asked. The Census will not ask about citizenship or immigration status.

What if the household identification code is lost or not available? Each household will receive a unique ID code for completing the Census form. However, if the code is misplaced, a household resident may submit the information via Internet or phone using a complete physical address. The unique ID is accepted only once. The Census Bureau will validate the address if a code is not used.

Is information taken by the Census private? The Census Bureau is committed to keeping your information confidential, private and secure. By law, individual-level census information cannot and will not be shared with any agency. Furthermore, cybersecurity measures have been put in place to keep your information safe, and any unlawful release of information is punishable by a \$250,000 fine and/or five years in prison.
